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OPENING KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Hector Flores. MD has a long-standing commitment to develop a health professions workforce that reflects our nation's diversity, placement of trainees in areas of need, and to utilize our nation's investment in health care as an economic engine to increase educational opportunities and the upward mobility of the populations being served. Dr. Flores is a founding member of the WMMC Family Medicine Residency Program that has received national recognition for placement of 70% of its 265 graduates in medically underserved areas, with 65% coming from groups UiM, and 30% of graduates in leadership positions in health plans, health systems, public health, teaching programs, and community-based practices. He is also a founding member of the faculty practice, Altais/Family Care Specialists medical group and IPA, which have received statewide awards for clinical excellence, value-based performance,

and improving the care of vulnerable populations.

Le Ondra Clark Harvey, PhD is a psychologist and the CEO of the California Council of Community Behavioral Health Agencies (CBHA). CBHA is a statewide advocacy organization representing mental health and substance use disorder non-profit agencies that collectively serve approximately one million Californians. She is also the Executive Director of the California Access Coalition- a group of advocacy organizations and pharmaceutical industry companies that advocates for patient access to behavioral health treatment. Dr. Clark Harvey has previously served as Chief Consultant to the CA State Assembly Committee on Business and Professions, Principal Consultant to the Senate Committee on Business, Professions and Economic Development, and a health policy consultant to the office of former Sen. Curren



For over 25 years, Dr. Liu has been dedicated to teaching. research, and the training of the next generation of physicians, researchers, and leaders committed to

CLOSING KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Assemblymember Joaquin Arambula, MD is the first Latino physician elected to the California Assembly. Since 2016, he has represented the 31st District that includes 62 percent of the City of Fresno and most rural eastern Fresno County. As an ER doctor in Selma, CA, he saw the emotional and financial toll on people struggling with illnesses that access to health care could have prevented. He was determined to improve health care for everyone. Dr. Arambula served as Chair of the Assembly Budget Subcommittee No. 1 on Health and Human Services from 2016 to June 2023. He has focused on improving health care access and affordability and ensuring the protection of safety net programs for working families. He has been the author of the "Health4All" bills, all known as Assembly Bill 4, that have sought the expansion of full scope Medi-Cal coverage to all undocumented adults. He also is a staunch advocate of efforts to address the critical statewide shortage of doctor and medical providers.

Ramón A. Hernandez, DrPH, MPH, is a Section Chief for the Division of Child and Community Health in

the Department of Pediatrics at UC San Diego, School of Medicine. A core area of Dr. Hernandez' work has been increasing the diversity of the healthcare workforce by nurturing and supporting underrepresented and disadvantaged students along their personal, academic and professional paths. He currently is the Project Director on the Hispanic Center of Excellence (HCOE) and the Health Career Opportunities Program (HCOP). Under HCOP, he directs the UniversityLink Medical Science Program (ULMSP) and is a co-founder of CA Medicine, the first of its kind community college to four-year university to medical school pathway in the nation. He received both his Masters of Public Health in Health Service Administration and his Doctorate of Public Health in Maternal Child Health at Boston University School of Public Health.



Stephanie Huerta Alvarez, MPH is currently the Manager of the UCSF Fresno Office of Health Career Pathways (OHCP) where she manages K-16 health pathway programming within the university's regional campus, including the Doctors Academy and California Medicine Scholars Program (SJV Regional Hub). She holds a BS from UC Santa Cruz in Human Biology and completed a Master of Public Health (MPH) at UC Berkeley. Stephanie was a teen parent and grew up in the small, rural farm town of Caruthers, CA. She is a proud alumnus of the first UCSF Fresno Doctors Academy cohort at Caruthers High School and is also an alumnus of Health Career Connection. As a first-generation college student and participant in several pathway programs, she knows firsthand the impact mentorship and pathways play in changing the trajectory and outcomes for youth and young adults in the Central San Joaquin Valley. Currently, she mentors 3-4 college pathway students a year via HCC and local undergraduate and graduate college programs.



Tomás A. Magaña, MD, MA, FAAP is a board-certified pediatrician with expertise in the care of vulnerable children, especially those impacted by immigration and the juvenile justice/foster care systems. He is Lead Physician in the Department of School-Based Health Centers at La Clínica de La Raza, Medical Director in the Masters Physician Assistant Department at Samuel Merritt University, and Assistant Clinical Professor in the UCSF Department of Pediatrics. Dr. Magaña has extensive experience in the design and implementation of health workforce pipeline programs for youth and young adults. As a Principal Investigator at the Public Health Institute in Oakland, CA, he is Founding Director of the FACES for the Future Coalition, a collaborative of national programs designed to prepare disadvantaged youth for entry into careers in the health professions. He is also Co-Director of the UCSF Latinx Center of Excellence Aspiring Physicians Program at San Francisco State

University.
