SB 40: At a Glance

- 3-Year Program Implementation
- 4 Regional Hubs
- At least one Hub in the Central Valley
- Promote students giving back to their local communities

- Passed Senate Health Committee with unanimous vote
- Heard in Senate Appropriations; no objections

- 4. Of the funds appropriated in this item, \$7,850,000 is available to support the Geriatric Care Workforce Programs.
- (a) Of the funds appropriated in this item, \$9,975,000 is available to support the California Medicine Scholars Program to establish a regional pipeline program for community college students to pursue premedical training and enter medical school, in an effort to address the shortage of primary care physicians in California and address widening disparities in access to care in underserved communities.
 - (b) The program shall establish four Regional Hubs of Healthcare Opportunity (RHHO), which shall consist of, at a minimum, three community colleges of which one is public or nonprofit, a four-year undergraduate institution of which one is public or nonprofit, one medical school, and three local community-based organizations. Each selected RHHO shall enter into a memorandum of understanding between the partnering entities, recruit and select a minimum of 50 individuals per applicable calendar year, and select individuals who have completed at least one semester of study in a California community college prior to selection. At least one RHHO shall be located in the Central Valley.



The California Medicine Scholars Program

- First convened in 2016 as volunteer group of leaders and professionals in higher education and medicine to look at how health disparities in California's communities could be addressed through diversifying the field of medicine.
- Mission: A statewide, structured partnership pathway to produce underrepresented minority physicians to reduce inequities and disparities in the health and health outcomes of California's diverse communities.



The Request For Applications

- The California Medicine Coalition invites collaborations of California Community Colleges,
 California 4-Year baccalaureate degree granting institutions, California Medical Schools, and
 community organizations (including community clinics, health centers and non-profit organizations)
 to apply to be considered as a Regional Hub of Healthcare Opportunity (RHHO)
- To create a diversity pathway from community college to primary care physician program: the California Medicine Scholars Program (CMSP).
- Supporting RHHOs incentivizes regional partnerships focused on implementing cross-sector and systemic interventions to implement programs and support for URiM students across the CCCs to medical school pathway.

The goal of CMSP is to develop a more diverse and competitive pool of medical school applicants from the California community colleges who intend to join the primary care physician workforce.



To accomplish this goal, successful applicants will demonstrate how they will:

- Establish or strengthen existing regional collaborative relationships among 2-year and 4-year postsecondary educational agencies, schools of medicine, CBOs, community clinics and health centers and other local providers, K-12 school districts, local government entities, foundations and businesses.
- Develop a systematic approach to **preparing community college students in the region to increase transfer and degree completion rates**, and to be competitive applicants to medical school in California and nationally.
- **Engage in partnerships** in which one or more of the partners can provide direct services and track student admissions, enrollment, and academic progress.
- Build a culture within the Regional Hub of Opportunity partnerships that promotes equity of opportunity in medicine and pre-medicine among eligible community college students and supports continuous improvement through systemic monitoring, evaluation, and making related improvements to the institutional services offered to URM and/or transfer students in their preparation for medical school application.



Funding Details

- Four (4) Regional Hubs of Healthcare Opportunity (RHHOs) will be funded
- \$540,000/year for 3 years
- Additional funds available for fiscal year 2025-2026 to each RHHO (approximately \$250,000 per RHHO) as bridge funding to ensure program sustainability.
- The contract will begin June 1, 2022, and end on June 30, 2026.
- Additional funding available for student mentors, direct student support, and RHHO capacity building among other items. Details to come.
